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I. SACT OVERVIEW

Mission

To collaboratively assess needs, maximize state and federal resources, support intervention and prevention activities, and improve quality services for domestic violence and sexual assault victims while positively influencing family violence policies and practices.

Guiding Principles

- Include those state agencies that deal with domestic violence and sexual assault
- Identify the most effective ways to address challenges experienced by entities that receive funding from SACT agencies
- Partner in achieving increased administrative efficiency
- Improve services by creating a seamless system for continuity of care
- Develop priorities for new funding and for addressing directional change
- Eliminate duplication of services
- Demonstrate commitment to fulfilling the mission of SACT

Membership

SACT is composed of nine agencies that meet monthly to address issues of common concern and to look for ways to collectively be more effective. These efforts have included information sharing, joint program funding and training, developing common performance measures, and administering a statewide needs assessment.

II. ACCOMPLISHMENTS

FY 2006 - FY 2008

In 2006, SACT members identified a number of strategic initiatives. Accomplishments and highlights through June 2008 are summarized below.

Strategic Initiative: Explore ways to ensure domestic violence victims' health and safety during their stays at domestic violence shelters.

- Department of Economic Security / Community Partnerships and Innovative Practices (CPIP) funded initiatives:
 - ✓ Arizona has over 1,000 beds in 37 community based domestic violence shelters throughout Arizona, 31 of which are funded by DES. Domestic violence shelters are contracted to provide a safe and confidential place of residence for a time period up to 120 days. Shelters also provide advocacy, case management, lay legal assistance and resource and referral for other needed services.
 - ✓ In 2007, two new domestic violence shelters were opened: One in Santa Cruz County, a county which did not have a shelter, and one on the west side of Maricopa County. As a result, shelter services are available for every county.
 - ✓ The Foundation for Legal Services and Education coordinates a statewide network consisting of Legal Services Corporations and domestic violence shelters. The statewide network provides civil legal assistance and lay legal advocacy to victims of domestic violence.
- In 2007, the Governor's Division for Women, DES / CPIP and the Arizona Coalition Against Domestic Violence (AzCADV) collaborated to host the Community Conversation. Nearly 150 participants representing 11 counties provided input regarding the status of shelter services in Arizona.
- SACT established a subcommittee to explore shelter licensure issues in Arizona. Subcommittee membership consists of collaboration between ADHS, DES, DPS, AzCADV and the Governor's Division for Women. A survey was sent to DV shelter providers to assess the need for licensure or accreditation for shelters. After review of survey results, SACT will identify next steps.

Strategic Initiative: Hold a Sexual Assault Conference in 2006 and identify prevention and intervention strategies that can be used by agencies providing services to victims.

- The Governor's Division for Women hosted the Statewide Sexual Assault Conference in April, 2006. Over 300 attendees from law enforcement, advocacy and counseling groups, faith-based types and prevention professionals, as well as victims and interested community members gained knowledge about the latest sexual assault research and to shared information with one another about statewide efforts around sexual assault.

Strategic Initiative: Expand awareness of Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault statewide.

- Department of Economic Security / Community Partnerships and Innovative Practices funded initiatives:
 - ✓ The Arizona Coalition Against Domestic Violence provides public awareness, training, and systems advocacy on a statewide basis. Initiatives include Stop Violence Against Women Day, Domestic Violence Annual Conference, etc.
- The Governor's Division for Women administered initiatives:
 - ✓ The DES Innovative Domestic Violence Prevention Grant funds programs that include public awareness and youth engagement.
 - ✓ Rural Domestic Violence Grant funds the Southern Arizona Battered Immigrant Women Project. Multidisciplinary county battered immigrant women teams operate in seven Arizona counties to provide education and training of professionals, survey existing culturally specific programs, identify service gaps, and devise community awareness plans through partnerships with nonprofit domestic violence victim services programs, and other community stakeholders.
 - ✓ The Governor's Division for Women sponsored the ASU Morrison Institute study, *System Alert: Arizona's Criminal Justice Response to Domestic Violence*.
 - ✓ The Governor's Commission to Prevent Violence Against Women asked ASU's Morrison Institute to identify and analyze outlooks and attitudes of domestic violence within the criminal justice system. The Department of Public Safety, Arizona Peace Officer Standards and Training Board (AzPOST), and the Governor's Division for Women sponsored ASU Morrison Institute's study, *Layers of Meaning: Domestic Violence and Law Enforcement Attitudes in Arizona*, which examined outlooks and attitudes toward domestic violence and the criminal justice system.
- The Attorney General's Office administered initiatives:
 - ✓ The Arizona Attorney General's Office partnered with local domestic violence service providers and area salons on the "Cut It Out" campaign cosponsored by Clairol and the National Cosmetology Association.
- State agencies provided representation and participation on statewide initiatives including the annual Walk to End Domestic Violence and a Domestic Violence Fatality Review Training.

Strategic Initiative: Track the development and growth of Domestic Violence Fatality Review Teams in Arizona.

- The Governor's Division for Women established a workgroup with statewide membership to encourage the development of Fatality Review Teams statewide.

Strategic Initiative: Explore the development of a task force to address service issues related to orders of protection throughout Arizona.

Arizona Supreme Court, Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) based initiatives:

- The Supreme Court adopted Arizona Rules of Protective Order Procedure (ARPOP) in September 2007. To launch the new court rules, the AOC produced computer-based training materials. The training materials consist of two training sessions on ARPOP and Project Passport. More than 250 discs were distributed to presiding judges and training coordinators in November 2007. The rules took effect in every Arizona court on January 1, 2008.
- Standardized protective order forms were implemented in all Arizona courts by the end of 2007 through the Project Passport initiative. Standardized protective order forms are now similar to those used by neighboring states. As a result, law enforcement officers in any state can easily recognize the order as a protective order, leading to greater enforceability and protection for victims. The National Center for State Courts spearheaded the initiative.
- More than 650 judicial officers and court personnel participated in training on ARPOP, Project Passport, and protective order case processing in FY08.

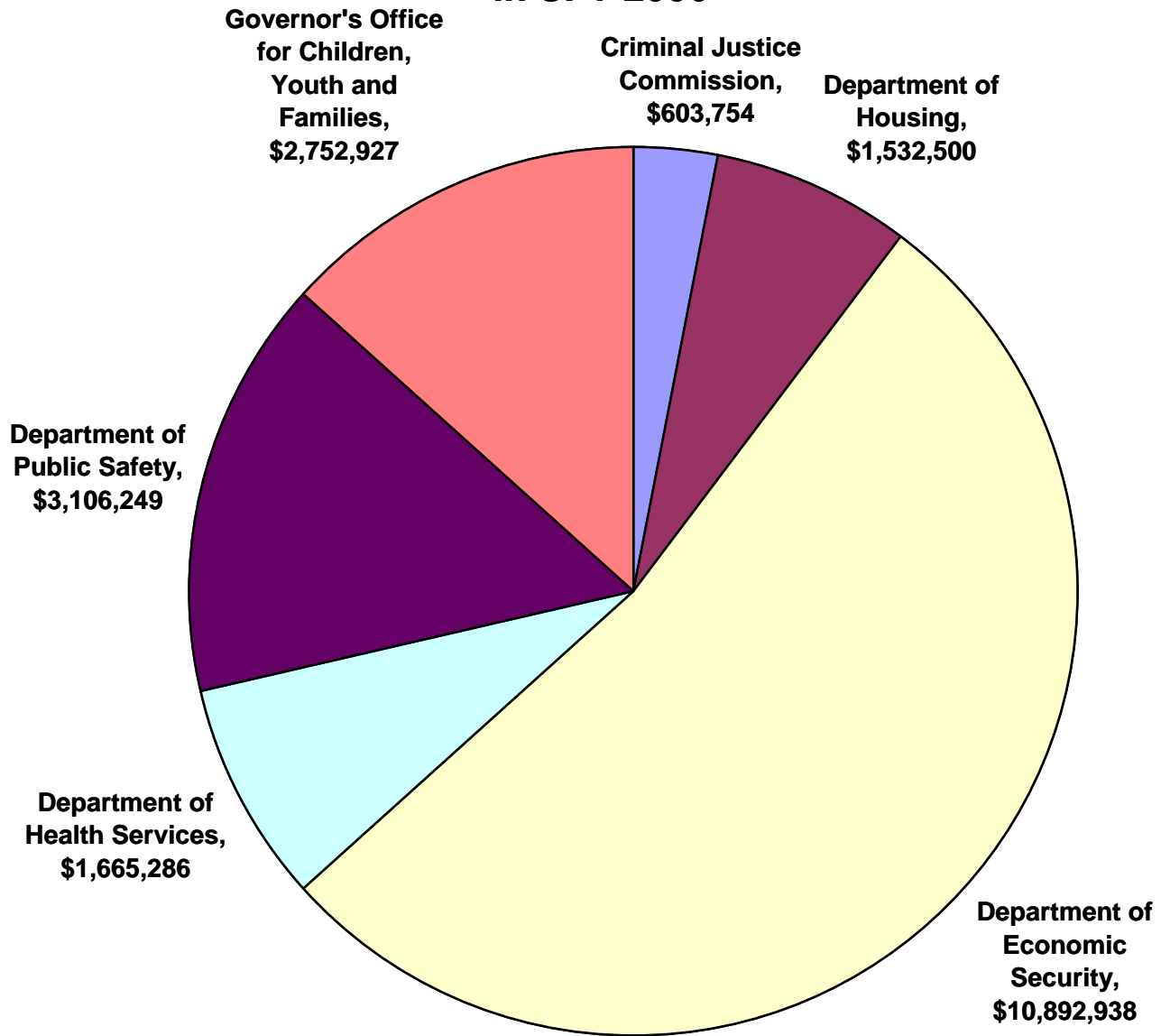

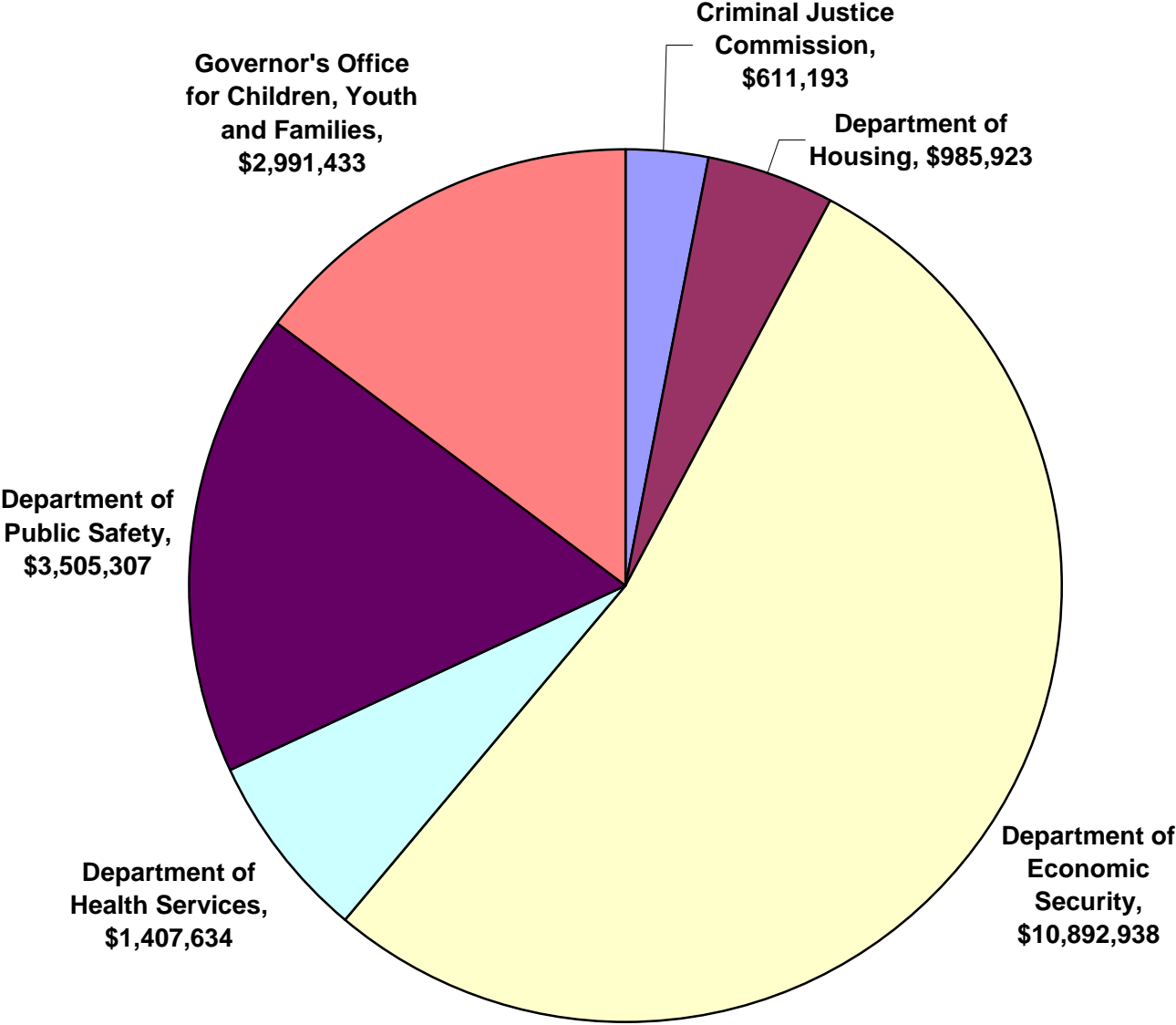
Supreme Court/Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) utilizes approximately \$97,500 in staff time and support to committees and \$32,065.79 in grant monies for a trainer dedicated to teaching DV case processing to court staff and judges DV case processing and also for working with the courts to ensure the accuracy of data in their case management systems. Additional funds were used by the AOC to provide domestic violence training to judges at New Judge Orientation and the annual Judicial Conference.

Office of the Attorney General uses \$2,550,000 million for state mandated services for all victims of crime. There is no way to report how much of these funds are used to support victims of domestic violence.

Arizona Department of Corrections (ADC) provides training and support to inmates throughout prison system, including victim impact panels and support groups for victims. As part of the general services provided to inmates in the system, it is not broken out as a separate budget item. ADC also offers inmates an education program on domestic violence. It is a 12-hour program that is approximately 6 weeks in length. In addition, inmates donate monies to domestic violence and sexual assault organizations through the department's restorative justice program."

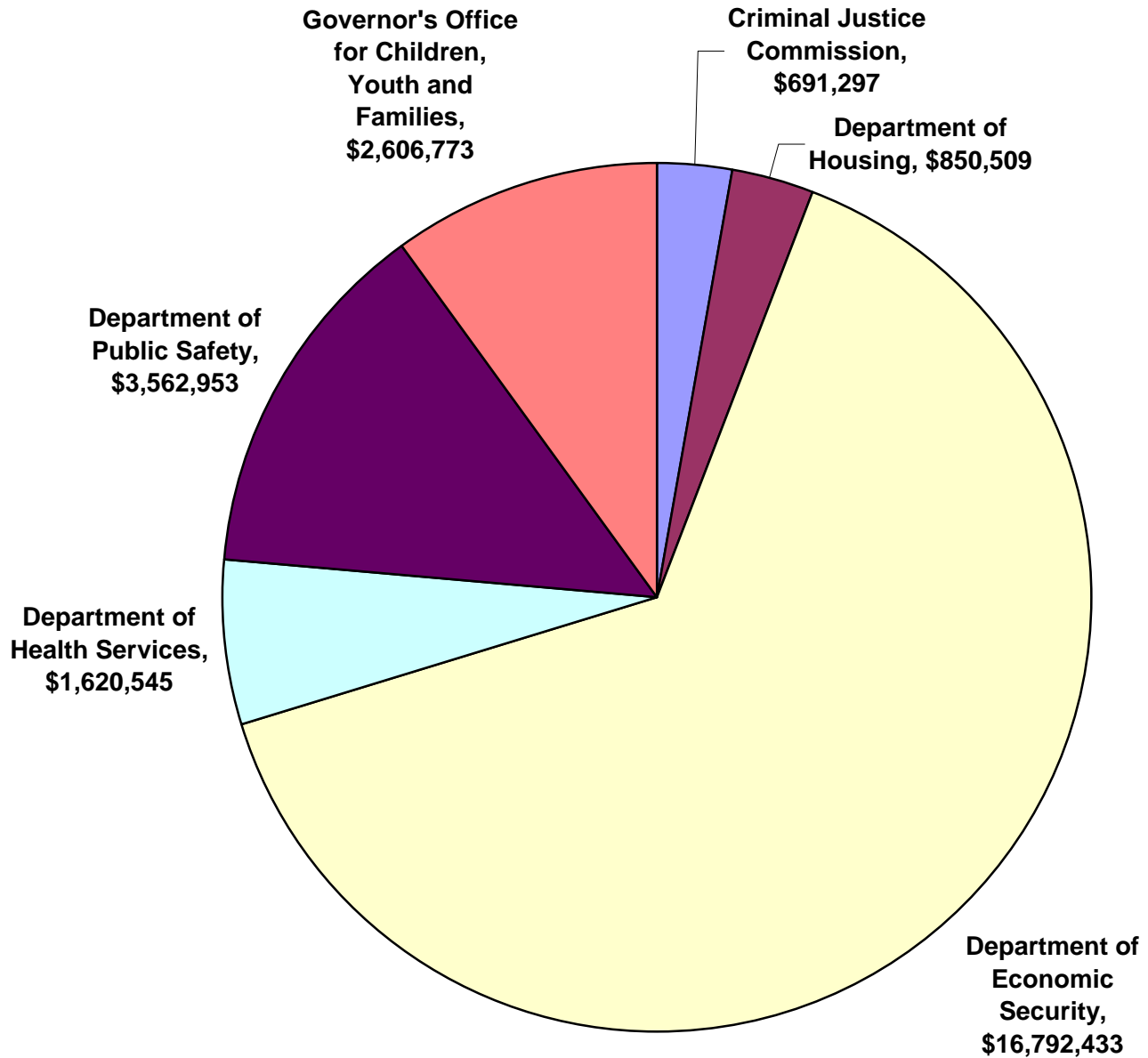

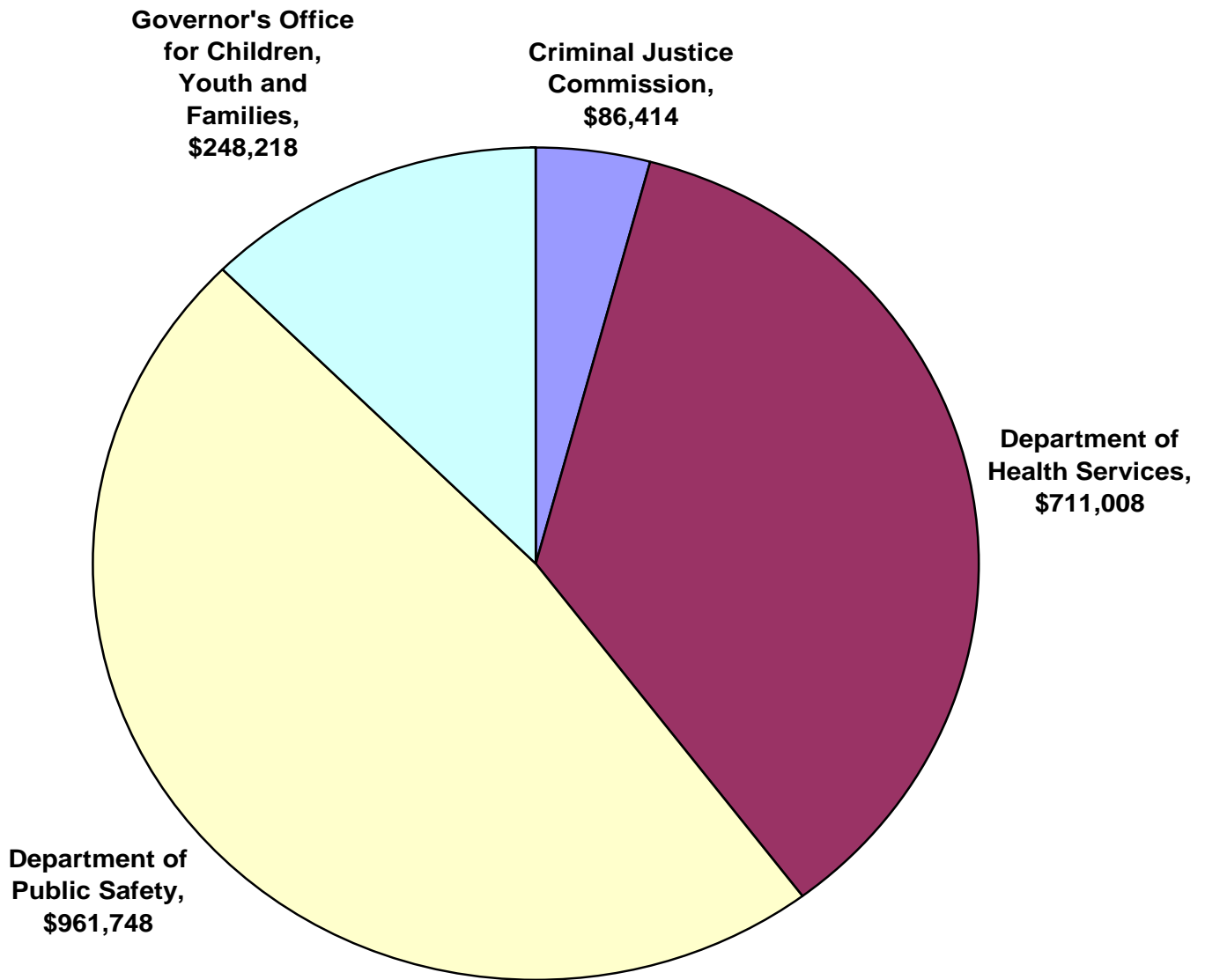
In Fiscal Year 2008 the **Supreme Court/Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC)** provided the following domestic violence services: staff time and support to various committees addressing issues of domestic violence in the courts; trainers dedicated to teaching court staff domestic violence case processing; programmers to make necessary updates to the statewide case management system (i.e., the Protective Order Module); and education for judges on domestic violence at New Judge Orientation (Limited Jurisdiction and General Jurisdiction), the annual Judicial Conference and the Family Law Judicial Conference.

Office of the Attorney General uses \$2,795,000 million for state mandated services for all victims of crime. There is no way to report how much of these funds are used to support victims of domestic violence. These services are addressed by multiple divisions at the AOC, therefore, they are not broken out as separate budget items.

Arizona Department of Corrections (ADC) provides training and support to inmates throughout the prison system, including victim impact panels and support groups for inmates who have previously been victims of domestic violence. In addition, inmates donate monies to domestic violence and sexual assault organizations through the department's restorative justice programs.

In addition to the funds administered by the **Department of Economic Security** listed above, the **Governor's Office of Children, Youth, and Families** receives \$440,000 of state funds from DES, and \$100,000 of federal funds.

in SFY 2006**



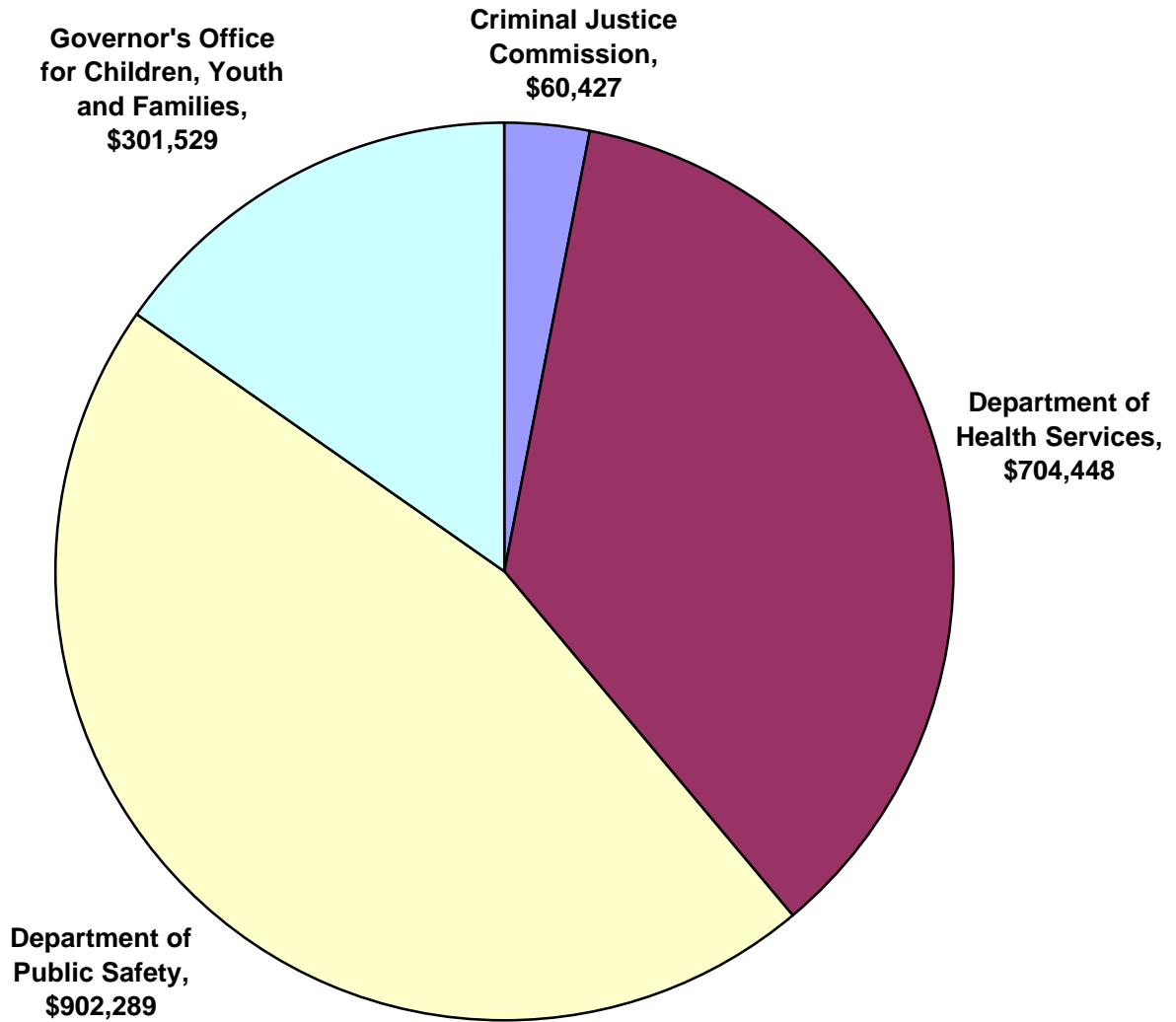

in SFY 2007**



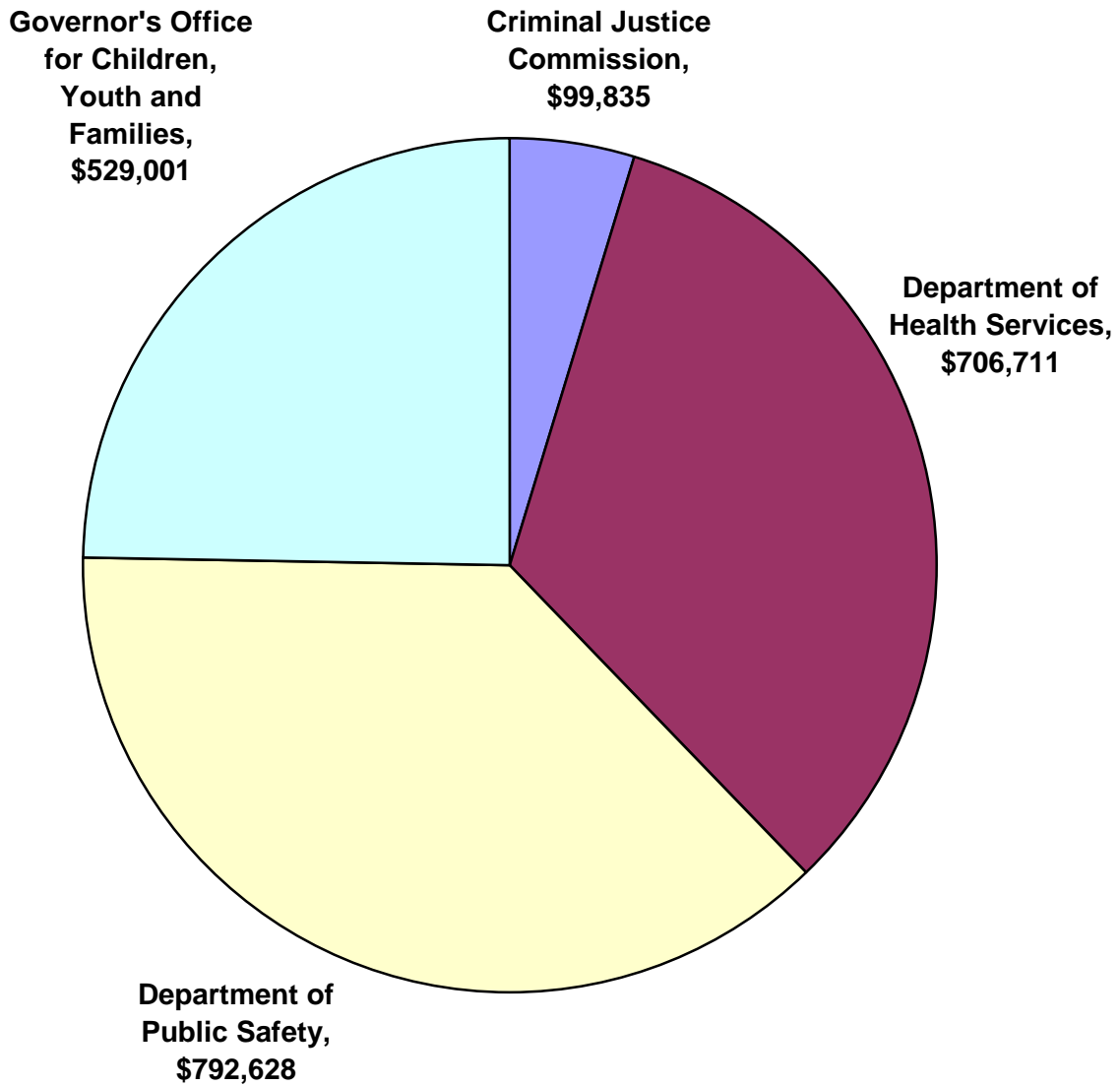
